#### **CHRISTINE SPIZZO**

Certified, ABT National Training Curriculum; Adjunct faculty, UNC School of the Arts; Ballet faculty, Dancers' Edge (Kernersville & WS) Born in Belleville, Illinois, dancer Christine Spizzo trained at the San Francisco Ballet School, the NC School of the Arts (now UNCSA), and at the School of American Ballet in New York. Upon graduation, she joined the National Ballet of Washington (DC), and the Ballet Repertory Company (NY), ultimately joining American Ballet Theatre in 1975. A soloist with ABT, Spizzo appeared in numerous Live From Lincoln Center and Dance in America telecasts, as well as the Herbert Ross films "The Turning Point" and "Dancers," and in Baryshnikov's "Nutcracker" and "Don Quixote" video films. Spizzo was a Principal dancer with Ballet Arizona from 1988-1990, and with the Nureyev & Friends North American tour in 1990. She performed in the

Broadway company of "Phantom of the Opera" from 1990-2000. Also during that time, she was an adjunct professor at both NYU and SUNY/Purchase.

In 1996, she served as Artistic Coordinator of ABT's inaugural Summer Intensive Program, and has remained a principal teacher in all subsequent ABT Summer Intensives (NYC, NC, TX, ALA). She is a certified *ABT National Training Curriculum* Instructor, Primary-L8.

In 2000, Spizzo joined the dance faculty at UNCSA, where she worked for 10 years, receiving the Excellence in Teaching Award in 2006. She taught in the School of the Arts' Preparatory Dance Program for several years, and, periodically, still teaches ballet at UNCSA. She is also on faculty at the Dancers' Edge dance studio in Kernersville and Winston-Salem. Christine is actively engaged as a Guest teacher and stager of classical ballet repertoire at various schools throughout North Carolina, as well as in New York, New Mexico, Arizona, Texas, and California. She has been on the ballet faculty of the Southeast Regional and Southwest Regional Ballet Festivals since 2014. Spizzo is the owner and co-founder, along with Mark McCullough, of Studio Elevé.



JOCK SOTO, who is half Navajo Indian and half Puerto Rican, was born in Gallup, New Mexico, and raised in Phoenix, Arizona. At the age of five, he began studying ballet with local teachers after seeing a television special featuring Edward Villella in the Rubies section of George Balanchine's Jewels. Mr. Soto continued his studies at the School of American Ballet (SAB), the official school of New York City Ballet. While at the School, Mr. Soto danced the role of "Luke" in Peter Martins' The Magic Flute, which was choreographed for the School's 1981 Workshop performances. That year, Georges Balanchine invited him to become a member of the Company's corps de ballet. In

June 1984 he was promoted to the rank of soloist, and one year later, he became a principal dancer.

Mr. Soto's extensive repertory includes featured roles in many of George Balanchine's ballets, including Agon, Allegro Brillante, Brahms-Schoenberg Quartet (first, third, and fourth movements), Bugaku, Cortege Hongrois, Danses Concertantes, Donizetti Variations, Episodes, Firebird, The Four Temperaments, George Balanchine's

The Nutcracker, Glinka Pas de Trois, Rubies from Jewels, Kammermusik No. 2, Liebeslieder Walzer, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Movements for Piano and Orchestra, Mozartiana, Orpheus, Robert Schumann's Davidsbundlerdanze, Scotch Symphony, La Sonnambula, Stars and Stripes, Stravinsky Violin Concerto, Symphony in C, Symphony in Three Movements, Tschaikovsky Pas de Deux, Union Jack, Vienna Waltzes, and Western Symphony. He has also danced featured roles in a number of ballets by Jerome Robbins, including Afternoon of a Faun, The Cage, Dances at a Gathering, The Four Seasons, Glass Pieces, I'm Old Fashioned, In the Night, Moves, Opus 19/The Dreamer, and West Side Story Suite, as well as Peter Martins' Barber Violin Concerto, Swan Lake, Symphonic Dances, and Valse Triste, and Robert La Fosse's Concerto in Five Movements.

Mr. Martins has created principal roles on Mr. Soto in a number of his ballets, including Adams Violin Concerto, Bach Concerto V, Concerto for Two Solo Pianos, Delight of the Muses, Ecstatic Orange, Fearful Symmetries, A Fool for You, Guide to Strange Places, Harmonielehre, The Infernal Machine, Jazz (Six Syncopated Movements), Morgen, A Schubertiad, Sinfonia, Songs of the Auvergne, Them Twos, and Thou Swell. During New York City Ballet's Spring 1988 American Music Festival, Mr. Soto originated featured roles in Mr. Martins' Black and White, Robert Weiss's Archetypes, Laura Dean's Space, and Jean-Pierre Bonnefoux's Five, and performed in Richard Tanner's pas de deux Sonatas and Interludes. In addition, he originated roles in Miriam Mahdaviani's Urban Dances; Kevin O'Day's Huoah; Mr. Tanner's Ancient Airs and Dances, Operetta Affezionata, and Schoenberg/Wuorinen Variations; Lynne Taylor-Corbett's Chiaroscuro; Christopher Wheeldon's After the Rain, Liturgy, Mercurial Manoeuvres, Morphoses, Polyphonia; Shambards, and Slavonic Dances; and Damian Woetzel's Ebony Concerto.

Mr. Soto has appeared as a guest artist with the Kirov Ballet in Jewels in 2003 and at the Bolshoi Theatre with stars from New York City Ballet and American Ballet Theatre in 2003. In addition to his guest appearances, Mr. Soto has staged numerous ballets around the World, including works by Balanchine, Robbins, Martin, and Wheeldon, and many more.

Mr. Soto's television appearances with New York City Ballet include five Live from Lincoln Center broadcasts on PBS: "A Choreographer's Notebook: Stravinsky Piano Ballets by Peter Martins," "Balanchine's A Midsummer Night's Dream, "Swan Lake" choreographed by Mr. Martins; Ray Charles in Concert with the New York City Ballet, reprising his role in A Fool for You; New York City Ballet's Diamond Project: Ten Years of New Choreography, dancing in Chiaroscuro, Mercurial Manoeuvres, and Them Twos; and Lincoln Center Celebrates Balanchine 100, dancing in Liebeslieder Walzer. Mr. Soto also appeared in Mr. Bonnefoux's Five, as part of the Guggenheim Museum's Works in Process series on PBS. He has appeared on seven episodes of Sesame Street, including three in which he appeared with former NYCB principal dancer Lourdes Lopez. Mr. Soto was a celebrity guest-chef on the TV Food Network's Talking Food, hosted by Robin Leach, and has appeared as a celebrity judge on Channel 13's Masterchef. He has also been featured on A&E's Breakfast with the Arts as Artist of the Week.

In addition to his performing career, Mr. Soto served as a member of SAB's permanent faculty from 1996 to 2015.

Mr. Soto serves as a visiting instructor at Banff Centre for the Arts for the Indigenous Dance Residency program. He has also been invited to teach at prestigious dance departments in colleges and universities around the country such as Washington University, Oklahoma State, and many others.

Mr. Soto was the recipient of the Casita Maria Award for Hispanics and The First Americans in the Arts Trustee Award. Friends In Deed recognized Mr. Soto for his patronage of AIDS research, and in 2002, the School of American Ballet presented him with the

Mae L. Wein Award for Distinguished Service.

During the 2017 New Mexico State legislative session, Mr. Soto received the State's Certificate of Appreciation from Senator John Pinto for his contribution to the arts.

Mr. Soto resides in Eagle Nest, NM with his husband Luis Fuentes and his pet beagle "Bandit".

Our Meals, a cookbook written by Mr. Soto and former NYCB principal dancer Heather Watts, was published by Riverhead Books in 1997.

Water Flowing Together, a feature documentary on Mr. Soto was aired on PBS in 2006.

Every Step You Take, Mr. Soto's critically acclaimed memoir, was published by Harper Collins in 2011.



### **JEFFERSON BAUM**

After graduating from the North Carolina School of the Arts, Jefferson Baum was awarded a full scholarship to the School of American Ballet in New York City. Mr. Baum started his career with the Pennsylvania Ballet Company and subsequently was a soloist with the Ballet de Monte Carlo touring Europe for two years. Upon his return to the United States, and for the next 12 years, Mr. Baum performed as a principal with the New Jersey Ballet, Ballet Arizona, Milwaukee Ballet, Cleveland Ballet, Santa Fe Opera Ballet, New York City Opera Ballet and the Metropolitan Opera Ballet. Mr. Baum has been a principal guest performer, teacher and choreographer with numerous regional, civic and New York City companies and ensembles in North America, South America, Asia, Africa, and Europe including a 6-week tour of China with the Los Angeles Ballet, a 4-week tour of Russia with Stars of American Ballet and a 3-week tour of Spain and Portugal performing on stage with Rudolf Nureyev. Throughout his career, Mr.

Baum has had numerous roles created for him; in addition to performing works by a vast array of choreographers including, Balanchine, Petipa, DeMille, Arpino, Ailey, Limon, Weiss, Comelin, Martins and Fokine. Mr. Baum has had the privilege of being trained and coached by some of the ballet world's most distinguished figures including George Balanchine, Rudolf Nureyev, Sir Stanley Williams, Duncan Noble, Alexandra Danilova, Frederick Franklin, Lupe Serrano and Paul Sutherland. Mr. Baum is an internationally acclaimed master teacher and choreographer. He has been the subject of features in the following publications: Dance Magazine, Dance Teacher, Dancer, Newsweek, The New York Times and The New York Times Magazine. Photos of Mr. Baum may be seen in the dance books, Tradition, On Your Toes, Off Balance and Dancer, Men in Dance. He served on the faculty at Steps on Broadway of New York City from 1993 until 2000 and on the guest faculty roster from 2000 to 2004. In 2013, Mr. Baum was invited by Peter Martins, Ballet Master in Chief of New York City Ballet, and Kay Mazzo, School of American Ballet Director, to the "Teaching Excellence Conference" in New York City. For 18 years he successfully headed the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp Dance Department, touching the lives of thousands of young dancers. Providing top-notch training and choreography with the top Ballet Ensemble touring Europe for three weeks annually, he transformed the Blue Lake program into a highly respected national-level summer dance department. Mr. Baum served as Director of Dance, Associate Professor at Grand Valley State University from 2000 to 2007. Given the task of developing this university dance program, Mr. Baum, at the helm from its inception, focused on teaching, choreographing, directing and producing dance performances of the highest quality with an absolute commitment to excellence. Since moving to Santa Fe, Mr. Baum has been Director of Dance at The National Dance Institute, and Master Teacher at the School of the Aspen Santa Fe Ballet. His students have gone on to professional careers with

major companies including: Pacific Northwest Ballet, Washington Ballet, Momix, Pittsburg Ballet Theatre, Milwaukee Ballet, Dutch National Ballet, Ballet Tucson, Nashville Ballet, Columbia City Ballet, Cleveland Ballet, Miami City Ballet, Kansas City Ballet, Boston Ballet and most recently Alberta Ballet and the New York City Ballet.



#### **RUTH HULETT: YOGA FOR DANCERS**

As a Doctor of Oriental Medicine and Certified Yoga Therapist, Ruth Hulett brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to her teaching. Having studied ballet since childhood, she was inspired to develop a method of teaching yoga to dancers in order to help them refine their technique, while preventing injury. She also works privately with dancers who are recovering from injuries or wanting to enhance technique through yoga. Her extensive background in anatomy and movement enables her to tailor a yoga practice to each

Mark's yoga practice is primarily influenced by the traditional Vinyasa style of yoga. His classes are intended for student practitioners of all levels and sports interests. He, himself, continues to take classes in yoga and Tai Chi, in order to expand and share his knowledge of the physical and philosophical aspects of holistic health. Mark is the co-founder, along with Christine Spizzo, of Studio Elevé.



SELENA MOSHELL began dancing at the age of four in Orlando, Florida at the School of Performing Arts. She continued her training at the Royal Center for Dance Russian Ballet School and graduated Cum Laude with a degree in Environmental Studies and a minor in Dance from Rollins College. ## **LOCAL FACULTY**



**PATRICIA DICKINSON Artistic Director of Festival Ballet Albuquerque**, has been Director/Owner of Dance Theatre Southwest since 1995. She began training with Nancy Robison Stone and the Southern Ballet of Atlanta under Karen Conrad, formerly with American Ballet, and Pittman Corry. She was a scholarship recipient at the North Carolina School for the Arts studied at the Graham Conservatory in New York, and received a BFA degree with honors from Southern Methodist University. During these years, she studied with Madame Valentine Belova, and Nikita Talin of Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, Ms. Dickinson danced with Dallas Opera and the Dallas Ballet, where she worked with such choreographers and teachers as George Skibine, Marjorie Tallchief, Arthur Mitchell and James Clouser. She was a founding member and co-Artistic Director of Dancers Unlimited in Dallas for ten years where she performed the works of Judith Jamison, Moses Pendleton, Bill Evans, Bill T. Jones, Matthew Diamond, Peter Pucci, and others. Her diverse training has

allowed her to move comfortably in roles from the Sugarplum Fairy in *The Nutcracker* to more contemporary ballets. She performed in film

and commercials and has produced fifteen record albums for the ballet classroom and three instructional videos. She served as Artist-in-Residence for the Dallas Black Dance Theatre and as Artist in the Schools for the Texas Commission for the Arts. She continues the "History of Dance and Discovery Workshops" program with live performances workshops she created for Texas and New Mexico elementary schools. She teaches master ballet classes throughout the country, and has served as a guest instructor at the University of New Mexico. Ms. Dickinson's continuing teaching and choreographic career spans the U.S., Canada, Mexico, and Europe. She lives in New Mexico with her husband, Larry Wells, and son, Nicholas. She founded Southwest Civic Ballet in 1994 as a forum for young New Mexico dancers to come together and learn performance skills. In 1997, she became Artistic Director for the New Mexico Ballet Company, serving over eleven years in this capacity until 2009. She founded Festival Ballet Albuquerque in the fall of 2009 where she has choreographed and produced such epic ballets as Nutcracker in the Land of Enchantment, Dracula, A Love Story, Firebird Ballet, Billy the Kid, Coppelia, Midsummer Night's Dream, Blue Jean Blues, and many more. Patricia has choreographed Firebird Spectacular for New Mexico Symphony Orchestra, Merry Widow for Opera Southwest, produced and co-choreographed Peter and the Wolf for NM Philharmonic, and choreographed The Soldier's Tale and cochoreographed Creation of the World for the Figueroa Arts and Music Project. In 2011, she was presented with the Bravos Award by Creative Albuquerque and the Dance Teacher Magazine Award for Excellence in Teaching (the only winner in the Private Studio/Conservatory category). She continues to travel nationally, choreographing and teaching classes.



**KEVIN GALLACHER** teaches Stage Combat, Acrobatics, Ballet, Jazz, Tap, Lindy Hop, and Modern Dance. As a professional dancer, Kevin has performed as a Principle and Soloist with Park Avenue Dance Works receiving intensive ballet training with Valeria Madonia and faculty, Festival Ballet Albuquerque directed by Patricia Dickinson, and Moving People Dance Santa Fe where he studied with elite artists such as Jock Soto, Michael Vernon, Sam Watson, and Dudley Davis. Santa Fe Opera for Don Giovanni and Romeo and Juliet for the summer 2016 season. He has added several film and television credits recently to his never-ending resume





Beth is currently on faculty at Dance Theatre Southwest and serves as a primary rehearsal coach for Festival Ballet Albuquerque.



**KYLE LINZER** started dancing as a senior in high school in California and has now been dancing for over 25 years. He started the dance program at Cleveland High School in Rio Rancho after teaching in the dance program at Rio Rancho High School for 10 years and has now been teaching dance for the Rio Rancho schools for 19 years.
